Media:

Assemblage with house hold objects + Photography

Alternative: collage from images found in magazines etc.


Motivation:

Assemblage Art is art that is created by assembling, combining, or arranging a variety of objects – found, bought, scavenged – to create a new work. Sometimes pieces are glued, nailed, or sewn together to create a permanent new creation. Other times the work is assembled, photographed and then disassembled (by the artist's hand, the audience (participatory work) or even by the elements found in nature. This type of work that exists for only a short time is called *ephemeral art*.

Many artists, both past and present, use this technique. Here are just a few examples:

Activity:
